Homehunt Gigha

The housing allocation policy used by the Isle of Gigha Heritage Trust is Homehunt Gigha. Anyone interested in renting any Trust housing must be registered with Homehunt Gigha in order to be eligible to apply for Trust housing.

Trust housing is allocated using the following criteria:

- 1. Best use does the applicant fit the best use of the property i.e. using all the available bedrooms.
- 2. Priority Pass awarded does the applicant have a Priority Pass. There are 4 categories of Priority Pass to apply under.
- 3. Date of registration if the first two criteria are equal, the applicant registered first would be allocated the property.

Development

MUGA – We are still in the process of securing planning permission. Should planning permission be granted, the project will move forward to tendering the construction.

Helipad - Local contactors have been working on site to complete the access track, drainage system and safety area. External contractors have been appointed to tar the access track and paint the landing pad.

Housing – The housing project continues to progress well, with an expected completion of September 2024.

Hotel – A tender package has now been issued for the bar renovation. The tender deadline is 12.07.24 and works must be completed prior to December 2024.

Isle of Gigha Ranger Service

The month of the summer solstice. Signifying the point where the sun is at its furthest from the equator, unfortunately for us, we could have had a slightly more dramatic solstice this year, but never mind! Despite this signifying the nights drawing in, it also means many traditions for people round the world, that include our historical heritage. For example, stone circles usually being positioned to capture and align with solstices; bonfires being lit to keep the demons away and bring luck; and for the Vikings, it was a day of hunting, raids and settling disputes.



A sad situation this year, we often see a reduction in the amount of beach litter into the summer months, but with such turbulent weather this year, the beaches have been inundated with plastic every month. Despite this, as the summer holidays are upon us, the beach bin at Garbh Beaches will be removed to discourage items that hard to dispose of on island being left at the side of the beach.





June has seen the end of Phase 4 of our Gateway to Gigha project. Arran Footpaths and Forestry spent a week here at the beginning of the month completing the final pitching to the summit of Dun Chibhich, and improving access near to residential properties at Cuddyport. We have just one gate to be hung at Cuddyport and we can say that the paths network is now complete! Our path maintenance is also well underway, so the summer is likely to have the backdrop of a strimmer. We have recently employed a little help with our strimming which has now been shared between the contractor, the IGHT Maintenance Team and the Ranger Service.

Isle of Gigha Ranger Service Cont.

Thankfully though, the children of Gigha have been on the environmental warpath! You may have seen in May's newsletter that the Ranger Service has been spending Friday's with the children of Gigha working on a marine biology topic that is related to the national science curriculum. We have run some awesome experiments on the beach: On our first week we used hydrophones to listen to the fishies to learn more about the "Forces" topic, looking at how sound moves through air and water, how this is super important for our marine creatures who use sound and echolocation to hunt and communicate, and looked at noise pollution. Our second week we spent testing water health (its acidity, biodiversity rating, and pollution rating) to cover the "Materials" topic, and the properties of chemical changes affecting our marine creatures, as well as solid, liquid and gas pollution in our environment.

We made beach nets to collect plankton and carried out a beach clean to see the break down rates of marine litter. On our third week we built amazing sculptures that were used in the parade at the Sound of Gigha Festival to raise awareness of environmental protection. Our final week we spent playing games and beach combing to explore "Planet Earth" and the diversity of living things on beaches, and different food chains. We want to thank Gigha Primary School for making this possible, we absolutely love running these sessions, and hope the children did too!

Our series of community STEM Astronomy Clubs came to an end with a bang as we looked at space exploration, the history of rocket design and propulsion engineering. We launched some of our own rockets which managed to clear the height of the trees surrounding the football pitch – a pretty successful mission. Environmental Impact Assessment Report

As part of proposed works to safeguard the lifeline ferry services for Gigha, Argyll and Bute Council are undertaking Environmental Impact Assessment Reports to support Planning Applications for the schemes. They have engaged a Consultant, RPS, who shall be undertaking site visits and surveys at Tayinloan and Gigha in preparation of these Reports. These surveys are non-invasive and involve periodic visits up to 31st August.

YOUR VIEWS on Kilchattan Chapel

Historic Environment Scotland visited in June to assess the site and encouraged us to put together a community project to make the graves inside the chapel visible or to record and capture the stones that are being lost to vegetation.

Suggestions include (among others):

- Elevating one side of the stones to help water run off and improve visibility.
- Removing and replacing the top soil layer to make an artist impression of the graves and record the information.
- Aggregating the chapel floor to prevent future growth.
